Before the start of the YFU program, Logan and Keith visited with Emily Qiu ('10) and Allen Qiu ('11) in Shanghai, staying with them and their 94 year old great-grandmother Tei Fang Zhang and joining in with their family reunion.

In Beijing, Logan enjoyed playing ping pong and bicycling with his host brother to the indoor swimming pool. Logan also helped Yu Zhaowei with his English language homework every night, as he had lessons every day while the parents were at work. During the weekdays with YFU, the students toured the Great Wall of China, the Summer Palace, Beihai Park, Tian'an Men Square and the Forbidden City. In Shanghai, Logan stayed with a different Chinese host family. He saw the PuDong New Area,

Interesting experiences included not having Facebook in China until the end of the trip because of unrest in the country, quarantine policy for all international travelers entering Beijing from abroad because of the swine flu scare, the heavy rain in Shanghai during the monsoon event in Southeast Asia, the partial eclipse of the sun viewed in Beijing, the fun times doing karaoke, the negotiating of prices in the marketplace, and Keith eating brains and liking it! Logan said he had a great time in China, and that his host families were warm and kind people who went out of their way to make him feel at home. Concession/Comfort Station Building Progress Continues

No, it will not be a grand field house and it was not meant to be. As approved by the Board last month, work will continue on the design and fundraising for a concession/toilet building at MLWGS athletic field. The building will include areas for concessions, ticket sales, storage, and restrooms.

Today, anyone attending a sporting event at the athletic field must travel to the school to use the facilities. For visiting teams, the lack of familiarity with the school layout can make this trip stressful. At many events, you hear "they don't have bathrooms."

The cost estimate that is being used is \$250,000 with \$60,000 already committed to the project. The Athletic Boosters, PTSA, and the Foundation have all provided support and energy to the project. In addition to fundraising, grant writing will also occur in the coming months to ideally leverage funding. Hal Waller, Foundation Director, will provide advice and support to the efforts.

convention in Washington, DC, held July 30-August 2. SABR stands for the Society for American Baseball Research, an international organization headquartered in Cleveland, OH. The Society's mission is to foster the study of baseball, to assist in developing and maintaining the history of the game, to facilitate the dissemination of baseball research and to stimulate interest in baseball. Approximately 1000 of SABR members attended this year's convention.

Susan won the USA Today Sports Weekly prize for the best poster presentation at the convention for "Rethinking Bill James' Pythagorean Expectation." In her presentation, Susan reached beyond James' Pythagorean, which requires only two team stats and one calculator formula, and built multiple regression models. Rather than using offensive stats to predict Runs Scored or defensive data to predict Runs Allowed, her approach was to use stats from both sides of the game as potential predictors of winning percentage. The poster presentation award includes a \$125 cash prize with a matching donation to SABR. ■

Friends of Virginia's Governor's Schools Sounds Budget Funding Warning

The current state of Virginia's economy means budget cuts across the board—and that means our school's funding is on the block, just like everyone else's.

But there IS something you can do about it. Friends of Virginia's Governor's School (FOVGS) is a parent-led group representing all 18 academic-year governor's schools in Virginia. Led by MLWGS parents, the group spearheads the fight to preserve our funding through legislative events and correspondence, interaction with the media, visits to the Capitol and local school boards, and student and parental involvement. Though our legislators are under a great deal of pressure this year to cut the budget, a well-placed visit, email or interaction—in your home, at the Capitol, at community events, even at church!—can let them know that we count on their support to keep MLWGS strong.

Our school is funded in three ways: by local school districts, who allot a certain amount per pupil, and through two funding mechanisms at the state level. While we have managed to avoid cuts in the past two years—we even got an increase in one—this year we are facing overwhelming challenges. And because cuts are being considered at TWO levels—local and state—we are in the unique position of possibly suffering double cuts.

What can you do? GET INVOLVED. Take every opportunity to spread the word about MLWGS, and get in touch with anyone and everyone who might have a say in our school's future. History Students Rub Elbows with Virginia’s First Families

Three MLWGS history students took their knowledge of the historian’s craft to a unique level this summer by engaging in an oral history project to capture the real life of Virginia’s Executive Mansion and its notable residents – the governors and first families of Virginia. With the mansion’s two-hundredth anniversary on the horizon in 2011, eight of Virginia’s governors, their families, and staff visited Richmond on July 12 for a picnic and the sharing of recollections about their historic home and workplace. Current First Lady of Virginia, Anne Holton, suggested participation by Mr. John Wilkes’ Historiography students following a very positive experience as the subject of an oral history project conducted by MLWGS graduate, Sara Freeman (’09).

Fresh off their own oral history work, Mitch Caudill, Maryam Patton, and Elsa Schultze quickly accepted the challenge of interviewing the first families and staff

members and transcribing their thoughts for public use. Preliminary planning featured meetings around the mansion’s elegant dining room table and at the Library of Virginia. Students had the opportunity to work directly with the First Lady; Assistant to the Mansion Director, Laura Fields, and The Library of Virginia’s Special Collections Director, Tom Camden in designing the project.

On July 12th the mansion’s special guests shared their

fondest memories with the MLWGS interviewers. According to Mitch Caudill, "The best part of my experience was being the first member of the public to hear stories that vary from fascinating, to funny, to occasionally serious." Maryam Patton was taken by "...the importance Virginians attach to the Executive Mansion, both those who lived in it and as a symbol of the Commonwealth in general. The fact that it's the oldest still used for its original purpose and the care that goes to preserve it and renovate it shows this even more." Though the full and final use of the interviews has not been determined, a new history of the Executive Mansion has been discussed according to the Library of Virginia's Camden. These student interviews would serve as a valuable resource for the next history of the mansion. Laura Fields hopes the oral transcripts will be immediately helpful in training the Executive Mansion's docents and believes stories from this oral history project may find their way into mansion tours in the very near future. Whatever the ultimate disposition of their work, all participants agreed their time spent was a special experience. Caudill noted that "There's a lot to be said for learning to be at ease around people of power and I think, perhaps, more importantly learning that the divide we create between elected officials and ourselves is fictitious at best because they are simply other people. Elsa Schultze was even more succinct, "I learned that if you seek it out, history can be very accessible." ■

In addition, we must ask that you refrain from compiling and submitting your own digital photo collages; these huge files require our staff to spend an inordinate amount of time rendering the ads suitable for online submission with our publisher, and the result is typically a comparatively low visual quality.

Be sure to indicate the size you prefer the ad to be, your name, the name of the senior being honored, and your address and phone number or email. Submissions may be mailed or dropped off. When choosing pictures for the ad, please note that the 2009 Yearbook will once again be an all-color Yearbook.

We'll assume that you want the ad to be a surprise, and

we'll send you the receipt directly instead of giving it to the student to take home. Original photos will be returned after the books are distributed in early June.

Because ad space is limited, submissions are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis, with the final deadline for submissions on Monday, January 11, 2009. Even ads meeting the deadline may be denied if previous submissions have already filled the allotted space; the Senior Ads section always fills up quickly, so don't delay!

Maggie Walker's Budget Future

For the current school year, Maggie Walker's budget is set and state and local leaders have not indicated that any changes will be made to the budget during the year. This year, the 12 participating localities pay \$7,290 in tuition per student with the Commonwealth of Virginia contributing additional funding making the total per student \$10,928.62.

With the current economic and revenue trends in Virginia, MLWGS, like other public schools in Virginia, will face a challenging budget year as work begins this month. The Commonwealth has already announced that there will be additional \$1.5 to \$2 billion that must be cut from the state budget. With this reduction, Virginia's general fund revenues will be at the same level as they were in 2005-2006.

Similarly, localities are also facing declining revenues with the dedicated 1% local sales tax for education taking ongoing hits as consumer spending remains weak. During the winter months, the MLWGS administration and Board will face difficult choices. ■

Athletic Boosters

Athletic Boosters is off to a good start this year, thanks to generous contributions from parents and the tireless efforts of our volunteers. This fall we contributed \$12,000 to the Athletic Department. We anticipate making a \$12,000 contribution for the winter and spring sports, too. This money goes for basic needs such as uniforms, equipment, coaches' stipends and team travel expense.

As Coach Holdren says, "We wouldn't have a program without Athletic Boosters." Our teams and athletes have won numerous awards in a very competitive league. The one team that didn't take the field, however, was the Maggie Walker football team. High schools rely on football to bring in revenue for other athletic programs. At Maggie Walker, Athletic Boosters fills the gap.

Dragon Fans enjoyed the scoreboard and new sound system this season, thanks to the Athletic Boosters. We also provided funding for the new gym floor and additional basketball hoops. Your contributions make it happen! We are currently preparing plans to replace the tennis courts, as well as lending support to a new concession stand with restrooms. 
